Bill: Bob, tell us about your family.....and, what are you doing now?

Bob: God blessed Jessie and me with four bouncing, challenging children. Now all these years later the picture looks like the following: Edwin, 52 (married with two sons), Patti, 50 (married with two sons, one daughter, two grandsons and one grand daughter), Marti, 46 (unmarried), and Sarah, 38 (married).

Bill: What years did you serve with TWR and where?

Bob: We were a part of the mission way back in the Chatham, New Jersey years, 1966-1971

Bill: How did God call you to TWR?

Bob: Jack Turney, who was heavily involved in TWR doing deputation as well as serving on the Board met me in a Washington DC airport. That was the beginning of my learning about TWR. Jack was convinced that with my technical background, I could be a help in this "technical outreach". So, Jack's style being what it is, he "leaned on me" for some time, and I am sure also prayed for us, until we finally signed up.

Bill: You were probably the second in a line of Assistants to the President (Dr. Paul Freed). What were your primary tasks in that role?

Bob: As his assistant, I actually got

involved in just about everything because back in those days, the staff was not all that huge and the president somehow got involved in all areas of the work. Therefore, I helped with technical evaluation and direction of various projects, processing of personnel, programming issues, writing and overseeing of contracts for all kinds of initiatives, and foreign relations with National Partners. I also was involved with the whole area of documenting our policies for the future, publications, and public relations.

There was also a great deal of travel, and Jessie deserves a lot of credit for artfully guiding the family while I was away. Along these lines, we should not forget hospitality. Jessie enthusiastically provided our home to many of the transient staff. This was an activity with wonderful fellowship that was a special blessing in itself.

Bill: I would suspect that you knew Dr. Freed in ways that few others knew him, working with him during those formative years of the mission. What did you see as the greatest gifts which Paul Freed used in leading the mission during those years?

Bob: He was certainly a man of vision and incredible energy. He was usually a few steps ahead of the rest of us and one had to keep moving to stay abreast of that energy level. To be totally honest about it, there were some very frustrating times, as is usually the case in life, but I must say that on balance, I felt used of the

Lord in my position.

Bill: In looking back over those years, which project in which you were heavily involved would you say was the most rewarding?

Bob: It was a thrill doing many of my jobs as service to the Lord as well as to the mission. I guess being a techy, antennas, transmitters and the like really got my attention, since they were areas that I understood.

I can remember the design project for turning the Bonaire antenna into a multi directional system, also the realization of the Bonaire studio which proved to be a kind of prototype for other studios throughout the world.

Bill: What one thing would you do differently if you had the chance?

Bob: Join when I was younger and leave when I was older.

Bill: After all these years, how do you look on the years with TWR?

Bob: Jessie and I see them in a very positive light and we are glad to still have contact with the mission and our friends there. I guess it would be fair to say that we wish we could have done more.

She walked through the doorway that leads to the lobby at Lakeside Residential Home to meet us. A smile came across her face and she graciously introduced us to the aide on duty. Lakeside, located in Belfast, has become the home of Norah Freed since December 2004. But Norah will probably never feel totally at home like the other residents because of her life experiences serving 32 years in Morocco and 44 years in Monaco.

Born in Woking, England on March 23, 1906, Norah Chambers was the second of 8 children. The Chambers family later moved to Belfast, N. Ireland where, at the age of 16, Norah attended special evangelistic meetings of W. P. Nicholson and gave her heart to the Lord. She attended Great Victoria Street Baptist Church where she remains today the longest standing member on their roll. After finishing public school in Belfast, Norah made the decision to attend Emmanuel Bible School in Birkenhead, England. She then completed a year course in midwifery in preparation for her future ministry in North Africa. Norah sailed for Morocco in October 1928, first working at the Emmanuel mission station in Larache and then in

Tangier. Her midwifery experience opened many doors that gave opportunities to serve and witness for the Lord. In 1946, Norah began working at the Tulloch Memorial Hospital operated by North Africa Mission (NAM). There she served for 14 years as resident evangelist in the women’s ward. This included nightly services in the hospital and later follow-up work in the homes of the women.

When the Voice of Tangier (VOT) became a reality in 1954, Norah and other NAM staff had regular contact with the radio team. This included Dr. Ralph Freed, the General Director, and his wife Mildred. Mildred went to be with the Lord in November 1957. When the Moroccan government nationalized all radio operations in 1959, negotiations were already underway with Radio Monte Carlo. Ralph Freed and Norah were married in Gibraltar on March 19, 1960 and spent their first 6 months of married life in Beatenburg, Switzerland, where a European office of TWR was opened. TWR began broadcasting from MC on October 16, 1960 and the Freeds moved to Cap Ferrat, France and soon after to Monaco.

In 1964, Norah was asked if she would consider giving a weekly devotional talk for women over TWR.

Speaking into a microphone to an unseen audience presented a new challenge. After much prayer, Norah felt it was of the Lord and began preparing messages for Woman to Woman. Almost immediately the letters arrived from listeners relating “the program was just for me”. It was broadcast from Bonaire and later from the transmitters in Swaziland. People were writing from around the world. Norah felt it was important to respond to the listeners personally. Thus, for 31 years, writing letters was a part of her daily routine.

After Norah officially retired from TWR in 1995, she continued to live in her apartment in Monte Carlo. When the decision to close TWR-MC was made known, the need to find appropriate care and accommodation for Norah became evident. With the assistance of her home church in Belfast, a place became available at Lakeside, a Christian residential home.

The Lord willing, Norah will celebrate her 100th birthday next March. Norah Freed’s life has consistently reflected 1 Cor. 10:31. Whether she was a midwife in Larache, hospital evangelist in Tangier, the wife of Dr Ralph Freed, or scripting and voicing 1682 Woman to Woman programs; she always did what she could for the glory of God.
